



Curbside Recycling Guide

Metal



- Metal food/beverage cans

- Paint cans
- Aerosol cans
- Containers that held hazardous products, such as paint thinner or automotive fluids

Paper



- Mail, office & school papers
- Magazines & catalogs
- Newspapers & inserts
- Phone books
- Paper towel/toilet paper cores

Boxes:

- Cardboard
- Cereal, cracker & pasta boxes
- Shoe, gift & electronics boxes
- Toothpaste & other toiletry boxes

- Pizza boxes or boxes soiled with food
- Egg cartons
- Boxes from refrigerator or freezer
- Paper towels, napkins, paper plates, cups
- Gift wrap and tissue paper

Food Box Guidelines:

If a box is from the refrigerator or freezer, **it is not recyclable**. Cartons are an exception, they are recyclable.

Cartons



- Milk cartons
- Juice cartons
- Juice boxes (remove straws)
- Soup, broth wine cartons

- Ice cream cartons
- Egg cartons
- Plastic straws

Plastic



Bottles and jugs (caps on):

- Water, soda & juice bottles
- Milk & juice jugs
- Ketchup & salad dressing bottles
- Dish soap bottles & detergent jugs
- Shampoo, soap & lotion bottles

Cups, tubs and containers:

- Yogurt, pudding and fruit cups
- Clear plastic cups
- Margarine, cottage cheese, cream cheese & other tubs (lids on)
- Clear deli, berry & produce containers

- Styrofoam cups, plates, or packaging
- Containers that held hazardous automotive & yard products, such as motor oil or pesticides
- Plastic bags & plastic wrap*
- Toys & kiddie pools
- Garden hose
- Black food trays & containers
- Plastic utensils
- Containers larger than an ice cream pail/bucket

*Plastic bags & wrap that are clean & dry are accepted at many retail stores for recycling.

Glass



- Glass food/beverage bottles & jars

- Drinking glasses, mugs, dishes, cookware, pottery & vases
- Window & mirror glass
- Containers that held hazardous products, such as nail polish or hobby paints
- Light bulbs
